And we pray for the family and friends of John, friend of Margaret and Des who has died of the virus. His funeral is on Tuesday and under the current constraints that limit family contact and mutual comfort his family are finding it difficult to cope.

We pray for NHS staff in all disciplines and at all levels, to keep them safe in the face of danger. The people supporting the NHS from both ends of the career journey. The student doctors and nurses swapping the classroom for work on the front line, and the recently retired, returning to the workforce to boost the numbers.
